CHAPTER V CONCLUSIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

A. Conclusions

After analyzing the illocutionary acts of Luffy's utterances that occurs in chapters 597-601 of *One Piece* comic, following conclusions are drawn:

- 1) Having analyzed the utterances of Luffy to his addressees by searching the utterances that occur in chapters 597-601 of comic entitled *One Piece*. There are 90 utterances of Luffy to his addressees. There are five types of illocutionary acts that occurred in Luffy's utterances to his addressees. They are representative(45,55%), directive(26,67%), commissive(3,33%), expressive(20%), and declarative(4,44%).
- 2) The most dominant types of illocutionary acts that found in those chapters is Representative (45,55%). Representative becomes the most dominant types of illocutionary acts, because *One Piece* comics market targets are children, so this comic use the language that easy to understand. Most of them are desribing, and statement, and as we know describing and statement are part of Representative.

B. Suggestions

By considering the conclusions above, there are some suggestions offered:

- 1. The readers who want to conduct futher research in illocutionary acts especially in adventure comic is suggested to understand the story and important role in interpreting utterances to get the intended meaning. It's not difficult to know the intended meaning of the utterances if a person knows the story. On this research, the writer knows the story by looking the pictures and reading the speech in the balloons.
- 2. The relationship between the addressor and the addressees is also important because it influence the frequency of the types of illocutionary acts that occur in utterances.
- 3. Besides the students, everyone is also important to study the types of illocutionary acts, because by understanding this material, it would be easier for them to understand why and for what purpose someone produces an utterance.
- 4. For other researchers who want to have clearer vision of the types of illocutionary acts application in society or for those who want to make further research about the use of illocutionary acts in society may have this thesis as a reference.
