CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

A. Conclusion

Based on the research problem and the research findings of the data analysis, the conclusion can be seen as follows:

- 1. Based on the analysis of this study, the researcher concluded that there are nine types of morphological process on colloquial language style used by Al Fathan in TikTok. Based on Yule's theory the researcher can answer the problems of study found in Al Fathan's TikTok videos through ten videos, and the types of morphological process were coinage, borrowing, compounding, blending, clipping, backformation, derivation, acronyms, and multiple process. They were coinage 7 words (7,77%), Borrowing 33 words (36,66%), Compounding 3 words (3,33%), Blending 5 words (5,55%), Clipping 16 words (17,77%), Back formation 2 words (2,22%), Derivation 2 words (2,22%), Acronyms 8 words (8,88%), And multiple process 14 words (15,55%). The total of words in nine types of morphological process that are 90 words.
- 2. The dominant types of morphological process on colloquial language style used in Al Fathan's TikTok videos that is borrowing. The researcher also identified the reason for the existency of the dominant types of morphological process on colloquial language style because Al Fathan was directly related to the context of situation which required Al Fathan finally use some types of morphological process on colloquial style.

B. Suggestion

The researcher would like to suggest the suggestion as follows:

- 1. It is suggested to enrich the understanding of colloquial style and morphological process used by some one such as in novel, drama, song or in videos from social media. It is also suggested in understanding how from the language can appear a new term from it morphological process.
- 2. It is suggested to add significance to the evolution for colloquial style description. And for anyone who interested in learning more about colloquial style that can be found in TikTok or others application of social media, and this is important for understanding how colloquial language changed over time. It is also suggested for the reader or another researcher use it as a source of further information while conducting future research on language style
